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### ELECTRONIC DATABASES FOR RESEARCH

Access these databases from the library home page.

<http://www.lib.umt.edu> → **Find Articles** → **Nursing** (or **Pharmacy** or **Physical Therapy**)

**Academic Search Premier:** multi-disciplinary database for all academic research  
**Health Reference Center:** information for both health consumers and practitioners  
**Journals@Ovid:** full-text of more than 140 medicine/health journals  
**Lexis-Nexis Academic:** covers top news, general news topics and medical news  
**Newsbank:** full-text to over 500 North American newspapers  
**PsycINFO:** comprehensive database for psychology  
**PubMed:** comprehensive database of worldwide medical information  
**Science Direct:** full-text of more than 1800 scientific journals

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## LOCATING ELECTRONIC AND PRINT JOURNALS IN THE MANSFIELD LIBRARY

To locate a journal in the Mansfield Library use the UM-M Journals Subscriptions list found on the library's web site.

<http://www.lib.umd.edu> → Journals → Find a Journal Title

For example, to locate the following article:

Halstead, L. S. (2001). The power of compassion and caring in rehabilitation healing. *Archives of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation*, 82, 149-154.

1. Connect to the UM-M Journal Subscriptions page using path shown above.
2. Use the "Find a journal title" option at the top of the page.
3. Enter **archives of physical medicine and rehabilitation** in the search box.
4. Press the **Search** button.
5. Your results will display where this journal can be accessed:  
**Archives of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation** (0003-9333)  
in **The University of Montana's Print Holdings**  
from 01/01/1996 to present in **ScienceDirect Elsevier Science Journals**
6. In this example, select the link to Science Direct to display a copy of this article electronically.
7. Use the link to the print holdings to connect to the Library Catalog. The catalog will display the call number and location for retrieving the print version of this article.

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## WORLD WIDE WEB RESOURCES

Use a general search engine, like Google, <http://www.google.com> to locate web resources. To focus your search on sites appropriate for academic research use the Advanced Search option and limit your search to specific domains, e.g. **.gov** (government sites), **.edu** (educational sites), or **.org** (organizational sites). As a general rule, you will have to carefully evaluate web sites with .com domains.

### Subject Directories:

Using subject directories is an efficient method for locating reputable web sites. Subject directories review web pages and include links to selected pages. These directories vary in the level of selectivity they use, but overall these sites are excellent sources for finding academic material on the web.
